FOUNDATION



Literacy:

This week our phoneme focus is: 'Jj' Jack Jellyfish and 'Uu' Uncle Upton.

We will also introduce adjectives as a way of making a sentence more interesting.

When writing we are continuing to use capital letters and full stops and trying to write full sentences.

Mathematics:

Number of the week is 17.

Number formation up to 20.

Counting skills will tackle sequences forwards and backwards up to 20, orally and from any given starting point.

Representing numbers using concrete materials on a tens frame and being able to describe what it looks like. Eg. I've got 6 and 4 and that equals 10. I've got 5 and 5 and that equals ten.

Children also need to be able to identify how many more to make ten. Eg. There are 6 counters on the tens frame, how many more to make 10?

Partitioning numbers into 3 parts. For example, 2, 2, 1 is 5.

Subitising collections from 6-10.

Measurement - length, capacity, mass:

Identify the attributes of length.

Compare and identify objects that are long, tall, short.

Religion: Wonder

Humanities: Geography - exploring and moving to Australia

YEAR 1

Literacy: ie - as in mmm pies! Identify fragments vs sentences.

Numeracy: Addition- doubles. Measurement: Ordering objects based on indirect

comparison of mass

Religion: Participation - Love

Humanities: Geography - Where is My Place in the World? This week we will look

at New South Wales, Sydney and the Sydney Harbour Bridge. RRRR: Feeling brave to achieve goals and then feeling proud.



YEAR 2



Literacy: LLLL Stage 7.4 split vowel digraph /o-e/ (best nose). Expanding simple sentences including who, what, when, where and why.

Mathematics:

Place Value - exploring numbers up to 1000 Measurement - measuring capacity of objects using informal units Addition and Subtraction- Continuing to explore strategies for addition and subtraction using doubles and near doubles. Introduce bridging to 10/20 for addition.

Religion: Unit called "Participation" - to be active participants in all that we do and being inclusive so that we allow others to participate.

Humanities- First Nations History: Continue reading Dreamtime storiesDreamtime Stories and the importance to culture.

RRRR:

"Help Seeking" - ways of making and keeping friends and seeking help when dealing with problems.





YEAR 3/4

Maths: Our numeracy focus this week is Data Representation.

Writing: In writing we will be exploring adverbs and paragraph writing focused on the The First Fleet.

Reading: We will continue our reading unit on Finding Our Heart and Dreamtime

SOSE: Inquisitive - Stories of the First Fleet

Religion: Identity Unit and Pentecost

YEAR 5/6

Literacy: We are continuing our novel study about "Storm Boy" whilst building on our knowledge of how to write well structured paragraphs.

Mathematics: This week we will begin our unit on location and transformation.

Religion: We continue to look at the topic of "Gratitude"

Humanities:Geography, we will continue to examine some of the different places and cultures of the world, including different indigenous groups. Students will have a chance to research the history, location and customs of indigenous cultures in Asia and around the globe.

RRRR:Students will identify examples of the kind of talk that causes hurt, harm or discrimination.
