WHAT WE ARE LEARNING

FOUNDATION



Literary: This week we will move from 3 sound words (CVC words) to 4 sound words in the form of CVCC words like 'went' and CCVC words like 'stop'. Students will be encouraged to stretch their words out to make sure they can hear and record all 4 sounds. We will continue to revise previously taught CVC words and our stage 1-4+ heart words. We will also continue to practise how to add the suffix 's' to words. We will continue our unit on fairy tales by reading The Three Billy Goats Gruff. In writing we will be explicitly taught how to use the subordinating conjunction 'because.' Children will learn that the word, 'because' helps to tell us 'why' something is happening in a sentence. Students will have the opportunity to practise writing their expanded sentences including the word 'because.'



Numeracy: This week we'll be counting up to and naming numbers to 40. We will continue to practise counting forwards and backwards from 40, as well as the 2s and 10s skip counting patterns. We will continue our work with addition within 10. In Measurement, we will continue our work with shapes.

YEAR 3/4

Literacy: Writing & Grammar - declarative sentences using pronouns, conjunctions and coordinating or subordinating conjunctions. Imagining a world without war, violence or needless destruction. Phonics - augh, ar, oar, ore, or, our, aw, au, or. Whole class text - Seashore Exploring. Fluency Passage - Hunting Hawk. Book Study - The Man Who Brought a Mountain.

Humanities: Mountain & River Environments Religion: Respect unit looking at the 18th Sunday.

YEAR 5/6

Literacy: Novel Study - The Bad Beginning by Lemony Snicket - We have begun reading The Bad Beginning, the first novel in the darkly humorous series about the Baudelaire orphans—Violet, Klaus, and Sunny—as they face a series of unfortunate events after the loss of their parents. As we follow their encounters with the sinister Count Olaf, students are exploring key themes such as resilience, intelligence, and perseverance. Alongside our reading, we are examining the structure of narrative writing and have begun crafting our own narratives, focusing on elements such as character development, setting, and plot.

Numeracy: Angles Unit: We have begun our new unit on angles, where students are learning to identify, classify, and measure different types of angles, including acute, obtuse, right, and straight angles. Through hands-on activities and real-world investigations, students are developing their understanding of how angles are used in everyday contexts and beginning to use protractors to accurately measure and draw angles.

Religion: Promise:

Continue to explore the concept of "Promise" within religious teachings, focusing on the promises found in sacred texts and their significance in various faiths. The unit encourages reflection on the importance of trust and commitment in spiritual contexts.

Humanities: The Industrial Revolution

Continue investigating the Industrial Revolution, understanding how this period transformed societies through advancements in technology and industry. Students will examine the causes, key developments, and the profound effects on people's lives during this era.

Health

Foundation children will acknowledge how it feels to be left out and discuss how to include others.

Middle children will discuss ways to respect others and investigate behaviour in various situations.
